MINUTES AND RECORD: Meeting for Worship on the Occasion of Business, January 14, 2024

We met in a hybrid meeting in person at the meetinghouse and on Zoom.

The Meeting opened with silent worship.

Clerks' Remarks and Query:

- The clerk shared from the recent year end retreat at Ben Lomond Quaker Center, where a participant spoke of our Meeting as having a transformative effect on its members. Dorothy shared from Romans 12:2. "And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may discern what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God." We come to Meeting expecting to be transformed. What might you expect, or have experienced, as transformation when you come to Meeting for Worship for Business?
- Friends spoke out of silence:
 - One Friend spoke of how the structure and committees in our Meeting, and in Quaker process, help deal with difficult issues. Several other Friends echoed this sentiment.
 - Another Friend spoke of how Meeting for Worship for Business can be frustrating, until a weighty issue arises. It is the practice on the simple issues that prepare us for the difficult issues.
 - One Friend recalled, when she was a new Quaker, how surprised she was at her first Meeting for Worship for Business. The wholeness of being in unity, rather than taking a vote, was something she had been searching for her whole life.
 - When faced with issues that aren't simple or easy, transformation, both individual and for the greater group, can come through Quaker process over time.
 - Sometimes an agenda item can seem trivial. However, through the process of Meeting for Worship for Business, the importance of the issue can be revealed for the greater good of the Meeting.

Witness Committee—Toward a Right Relationship With Indigenous Peoples

Over the past few years our Meeting has engaged in education regarding the history and current situations of Native Americans, in particular the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan tribe. We are aware that our meeting house and our homes are on Nisenan land that was never ceded. We have learned of the genocide of the Nisenan people with the gold rush in our area , as well as the genocide of native people throughout California and across the continent. We have become aware of Quaker involvement in the Indian boarding schools that attempted to destroy Indian culture.

Committed to further learning and action, we began reading the Nevada City Ranchería Nisenan land acknowledgment at the beginning of each Meeting for Worship. We began educating ourselves and the children of our meeting about native peoples' relation to the natural world. We understand that their teachings can help us see, and perhaps repair, the damage we have done to the earth, the place where we all live, changing how we live our lives. This understanding of indigenous relationship offers pathways to reforming our food systems, land and species preservation, and our consumption of resources.

We are now ready to go beyond land acknowledgment and take steps toward a right relationship with the Nisenan, other native peoples and our home, the earth. This Witness Committee is formed with that intent.

This is an invitation to Grass Valley Friends Meeting members and regular attenders of Meeting for Worship who would like to participate in this committee.



Announcement: Woolman in contract with CHIRP

January 8, 2024

College Park Friends Educational Association (Woolman) joyously announces that it has entered into escrow with <u>California Heritage</u>: <u>Indigenous Research Project (CHIRP)</u> with the intention of ethically transitioning the Woolman land and property to CHIRP for the benefit of the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe, on whose ancestral homeland the Woolman property sits. We are excited about CHIRP's vision for the Nisenan's ancestral land, which includes youth programming.

As with any real estate agreement, there are contingencies to be resolved, and this may take several months. In the meantime, if you wish to contribute to Woolman's ongoing operating costs pending the land transition, please donate here. QUAKER CALL TO ACTION: "A DEEPER DIVE INTO RANKED CHOICE VOTING AND HOW IT CAN TRANSFORM OUR ELECTIONS"

REGISTER HERE to join us on **Tuesday**, **January 30**, **8:00-9:30PM Eastern Time** for a national zoom call with **Rob Richie of FairVote** and **Cynthia Richie Terrell of RepresentWomen** for a deeper dive into ranked choice voting and how it can repair and strengthen our democracy. Learn how the National Popular Vote Plan and the Fair Representation Act can transform future Presidential and Congressional elections, and how a growing number of women are being elected to public office in the US.

NEWS FLASH!!! We will be joined on the call by special guest, **Rep. Jamie Raskin** (**MD-8**). Rep. Raskin, who is in 4th term in the US House of Representatives, has been a tireless champion for civil rights and civil liberties. He was the lead manager in the 2nd impeachment trial of former president Donald Trump in 2020 and he served on the Select Committee to Investigate the January 6th Attack on the US Capitol.

Rob and Cynthia are Quakers who co-founded <u>FairVote</u> in 1992. Their lifework has been committed to creating a stronger democracy, driven by their commitment to Friends' principle of radical equality.

<u>FairVote</u> is the national driving force behind advancing ranked choice voting (RCV) and proportional RCV in legislative districts to give voters more choices, fairer representation and better government. <u>RepresentWomen</u> is committed to gender-balanced representation in elected and appointed positions, at every level of government, and works on evidence-based solutions that break down structural barriers to women's political leadership.

WE NEED YOUR INPUT FOR THE WELCOME PARK! ACT NOW!

The National Park Service proposes to rehabilitate <u>Welcome Park</u>, the site of William Penn's home, *the Slate Roof House* to provide a more welcoming, accurate, and inclusive experience for visitors. Welcome Park was designed by the internationally acclaimed design firm Venturi & Scott Brown Associates. The park is named for the ship, Welcome, which transported Penn to Philadelphia...



"The proposed rehabilitation of Welcome Park includes expanded interpretation of the Native American history of Philadelphia and was developed in consultation with representatives of the indigenous nations of the Haudenosaunee, the Delaware Nation, Delaware Tribe of Indians, the Shawnee Tribe, and the Eastern Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma. The reimagined Welcome Park maintains certain aspects of the original design such as the street grid, the rivers and the east wall while adding a new planted buffer on three sides, and a ceremonial gathering space with circular benches. The Penn statue and Slate Roof house model will be removed and not reinstalled. In a separate and future effort, new exhibit panels will be installed on the south site wall to replace the Penn timeline.

We have the opportunity to provide input into this decision. The public is invited to submit comments on this proposed design for the rehabilitation of Welcome Park for a 14-day period from January 8th – 21st, 2024 through the National Park Service's Planning, Environment and Public Comment (PEPC) at https://parkplanning.nps.gov. Comments submitted through social media, phone calls, email or mail will not be accepted. All public comments must be received through PEPC by midnight Sunday, January 21st, 2024."
