

How have we been sensitive to the personal needs and difficulties of members and attenders, young and old? Do we visit one another in our homes and keep in touch with distant members?



ANNUAL APPEAL, December, 2024

Dear Friends.

Grass Valley Friends Meeting applauds 2024 and its unique opportunities. GVFM stood witness and provided support to many of those involved in the land transition as the Sierra Friends Center changed hands to become Yulica Village, owned by the California Heritage Indigenous Research Project (CHIRP), in service to the local Nisenan tribe. We met technological challenges to hold our far-flung spiritual community together. We have come to know one another better, gaining spiritual strength for both ourselves individually and for our Friends Meeting. You are a part of this community.

This year has been unique because our Meeting had several significant, non-reoccurring expenses: a significant financial contribution to CHIRP and payment of \$2,000 to maintain the Meeting's website and to upgrade computer equipment and software.

Challenges include reduced in-person attendance to Meeting gatherings. We miss the presence of many people. Maintaining visibility in our local communities is challenged by a reduced number of Friends and attenders available to participate in volunteer service, outreach activities and provide financial support. Our contributions to Utah's Place/Hospitality House, Friends Committee on National Legislation, Friends Committee on California Legislation, Friends House, Quaker Center, the American Friends Service Committee, Nonviolent Peaceforce and the Laura Wilcox Memorial Fund at FCNL depend on donations greater than our regular expenses.

The Meeting is prayerfully considering our faith community's spiritual health and strength. In addition to offering programs that stimulate growth and depth, we are present with the Nisenan community as they transition to full utilization of the Yulica Village property.

Outreach and visibility in our local communities as a viable spiritual resource is a center of discernment. Supporting local community services is one means of visibility for GVFM. Currently, it is especially important that our Meeting's spiritual strength is available to all who need support.

There are fundamental expenses your generosity allows us to pay. As 2024 ends, please consider contributing to Grass Valley Friends Meeting with both an end of year financial gift as well as an on-going monthly donation of \$60.00/month. Monthly donations help cover monthly expenses.


NEW TO THE GVFM LIBRARY

Why are young people leaving their country to walk to the United States to seek a new, safe home? Over 100,000 such children have left Central America. This book of poetry helps us to understand why and what it is like to be them.



This powerful book by award-winning Salvadoran poet Jorge Argueta describes the terrible process that leads young people to undertake the extreme hardships and risks involved in the journey to what they hope will be a new life of safety and opportunity. A refugee from El Salvador's war in the eighties, Argueta was born to explain the tragic choice confronting young Central Americans today who are saying goodbye to everything they know because they fear for their lives. This book brings home their situation and will help young people who are living in safety to understand those who are not.

Compelling, timely and eloquent, this book is beautifully illustrated by master artist Alfonso Ruano who also illustrated *The Composition*, considered one of the 100 Greatest Books for Kids by *Scholastic's Parent and Child Magazine*.

Sustainable Economic Systems:

12/24. Plastic money, a way of ending plastic pollution? The Sustainable and Just Economic Systems (SJES) programme team from the Quaker United Nations Office (QUNO), represented by Associate Representative Andrés Naranjo and Senior Technical Advisor Ronald Steenblik, recently participated in the fifth Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee (INC-5), held from 25 November to 1 December in Busan, Republic of Korea, as part of the FWCC delegation

UN Women:

11/24: UN Security Council held the "Women Building Peace in a Changing Environment" panel discussion. Economic empowerment of women is directly related to their ability to take leadership roles in their communities' peacebuilding efforts. There is a need for training on public speaking and other advocacy skills that will further enhance women's power as peacebuilders in their region. The importance of trauma sensitive engagement was discussed. They recognized that in conflict situations, people of all genders have internal, personal trauma that must be attended to alongside societal peacebuilding concerns. To see UN policy localized in an effective way that promotes lasting peace, efforts must look at a community and its people holistically, uplifting their internal and external concerns.

Considered the most progressive blueprint ever for advancing women's rights, the <u>Beijing Declaration</u> and Platform for Action has been reprinted in this special edition, which also includes a copy of the political declaration reached at the 23rd special session of the General Assembly in 2000, which reviewed progress towards the Platform for Action five years after its adoption.

Women procures more than USD 176 million worth of services and goods each year to support its programme of work. UN Women is committed to promoting gender equality and the empowerment of women worldwide, while delivering green results, with an emphasis on transparency and effectiveness.

Climate Change:

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, has "a rapidly closing window of opportunity to secure a liveable and sustainable future for all".

Political organizing and actions at COP have provided a clear call to conscience, highlighting the damage and destruction climate change is inflicting on the poor and vulnerable, calling for climate reparations, and showcasing the inverse relationship between exorbitant military spending and paltry investments in climate funds. In contrast to the breakdown of dialogue happening throughout the conference, QUNO's side event on peace and climate featured panelists who spoke from differing experiences about a shared vision for how to take climate action that will truly make us safe. The panel was moderated by QUNO's by Lindsey Fielder-Cook.

The election is over. Our work is not. – OPINION by Bridget Moix

December 4, 2024

(RNS) — With the election season behind us, all Americans need to turn to the work of building democracy day by day, in our communities and with our elected officials, those we agree with and those we don't. (RNS) — Barely a month ago, more than 150 million Americans went to the polls and voted for their new leaders in Washington. No matter how you voted, the results are in and a new administration and Congress are preparing to take office next month. With that, our work at the Friends Committee on National Legislation continues.

Our persistent, nonpartisan Quaker advocacy organization has more than 80 years of experience lobbying Congress and various administrations, and we look forward to working with the incoming 119th Congress on a wide range of issues of concern to our community — war and peace, economic justice, immigration, the environment. We also feel compelled to raise a warning of the threats we see in the reelection of Donald Trump as president.

We are deeply concerned by the renewed threats a Trump presidency presents to the dignity and lives of millions in our country and around the world, many of whom we work with daily. We call on President-elect Trump to uphold the Constitution, comply with national and international norms and laws and to respect the rights and dignity of all people.

We regard the 118th Congress as a vital time to prepare for the opening weeks of the 119th. With this year's appropriations bills still unfinished, crucial funding decisions on poverty alleviation, peacemaking and security have yet to be made. With the new administration signaling its intention to make major new cuts to federal programs for those most in need while extending tax cuts for the rich, now is the time to vigorously engage with lawmakers.

The United States is a democracy, no matter the threats lining up against it. But our democracy depends on all Americans' active and engaged participation. With the election season behind us, we need to turn to the ongoing work of building democracy day by day, in our communities and with our elected officials, those we agree with and those we don't.

In 1659, the English Quaker preacher Edward Burrough said, "We are not for one party or against another. ... We are for justice and mercy and truth and peace and true freedom, that these may be exalted in our nation, and that goodness, righteousness, meekness, temperance, peace and unity with God, and with one another, that these things may abound." This is as true today as it was before the United States existed.

For our part, we will redouble our efforts to create cooperation across political divides and foster peace amid conflict. Diversity of thought is one of the greatest strengths of our democracy. We are committed to working with all political parties and across the beautiful diversity of our country to advance our sacred, beloved community. That includes seeking common ground with the second Trump administration to advance laws and policies for the common good.

As people of hope, we will persist in our belief that our democracy is strongest when we are all engaged with it and with one another. Not Republicans. Not Democrats. Not independents. But all who call this nation home.

As people of faith, we'll bring a voice of moral conscience to the policy process. We stand in solidarity with people most impacted by the policies our federal government implements. We affirm our commitment to building the world we seek, a world free of war and the threat of war, with justice and equity for all, where every person's potential may be fulfilled, and where our precious Earth is restored.

Most importantly, we will continue to fiercely advocate and lovingly defend human dignity and protect the rights of all people. We will stand firm in our historic peace witness that war is not the answer because peace is possible and within reach. We will lobby to protect the environment and the fullness of God's creation.

Faith calls us to practice hope during tough times and to narrow the gap between what is and what should be. We are called to live a prophetic witness for the world we seek and to put our hearts and hands to action for it.

We are called to love our enemies, without exception, and to work for the transformation of our world into the community we know is possible. The election is over; our work is not.
