Appreciation was expressed for Threshing session regarding the potential move to Peace Lutheran. The following minute was read and approved:

Minute 12.2025.01

Grass Valley Friends Meeting has reached unity to move our Meeting's regular worship and activities into the town of Grass Valley and to enter into an agreement with Peace Lutheran Church. Approved.

The import of this minute was acknowledged, and additional language was offered and requested to be added to the record.

We undertake this step after a period of discernment, listening for the guidance of Spirit and considering the needs of our Meeting and the Nisenan, who have graciously hosted us on this land and who are ready to settle more deeply into their home.

We are grateful for the hospitality and openness extended by Peace Lutheran Church, and for the way this partnership supports our desire to be more accessible, welcoming, and connected.

We recognize that this transition marks an important threshold in the life of our Meeting. We commit ourselves to moving forward with care, good will, and trust, holding one another—and our new partners—in the Light as we navigate the practical and spiritual dimensions of this change.

Through heartfelt deliberations and careful discernment, seeking God's will, Grass Valley Friends meeting came to unity on moving our place of worship to Peace Lutheran Church in Grass Valley. As we prepare to leave, we give thanks to our Quaker elders who held meeting for worship on this land for the past sixty years. We give thanks to this land that nourished and taught us, deepening our connection to that of God in all. We give thanks to Pastor Christian and the Peace Lutheran community who have so warmly welcomed us to have our place of worship in their buildings. We give thanks to the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe who with grace and generosity, invited us to remain in the space we knew as our meetinghouse until it became clear to us that it was time to move on, to allow the Tribe to have their full homeland and to allow us to open to the possibilities that a move to town might offer. We give thanks to God for showing us the way.

In response to deep concern about what appeared to be a racially motivated attack on a person in Grass Valley, the Meeting came to unity on offering this minute

Minute 12.2025.02. Grass Valley Friends Meeting holds in the Light the person injured in the recent racially motivated assault in our community. We recognize that there is both direct and indirect harm caused by this act, including those who used violence in this way. We hold hope for healing and commit to listening for ways to nurture peace in the face of injustice.

This minute will be made public. Welcome Committee will take responsibility for this.

A letter regarding the incident from the Nevada County Interfaith Council was read and the following minute was approved.

Standing Together in Oneness

Nevada County is home to a rich and diverse community of faiths, each offering its own wisdom and traditions. Yet within our differences, the Nevada County Interfaith Council holds a shared and enduring truth: the oneness of humankind.

Recently, our community experienced an act rooted in fear and division. As spiritual leaders, we cannot be silent in the face of anything that seeks to diminish the dignity of our neighbors. We affirm, clearly and wholeheartedly, that such actions have no place in a community committed to compassion, respect, and mutual understanding.

Every faith represented in our council teaches the inherent worth and sacredness of every human being. When harm is directed at one, the fabric that holds all of us is tugged. Our response is to strengthen that fabric—to

show up for one another, to lift up the values we share, and to recommit ourselves to creating a community where all people feel safe, seen, and valued. The Nevada County Interfaith Council stands firmly for unity, for dignity, and for the simple truth that we belong to one another. We will continue to work together—across traditions, beliefs, and cultures—to nurture peace, deepen connection, and uphold the oneness that binds us.

We invite our neighbors to join us in choosing love over fear, understanding over division, and shared humanity over separation. This is who we are, and this is the future we continue to build together.

The Internal Oracle by Don McCormick

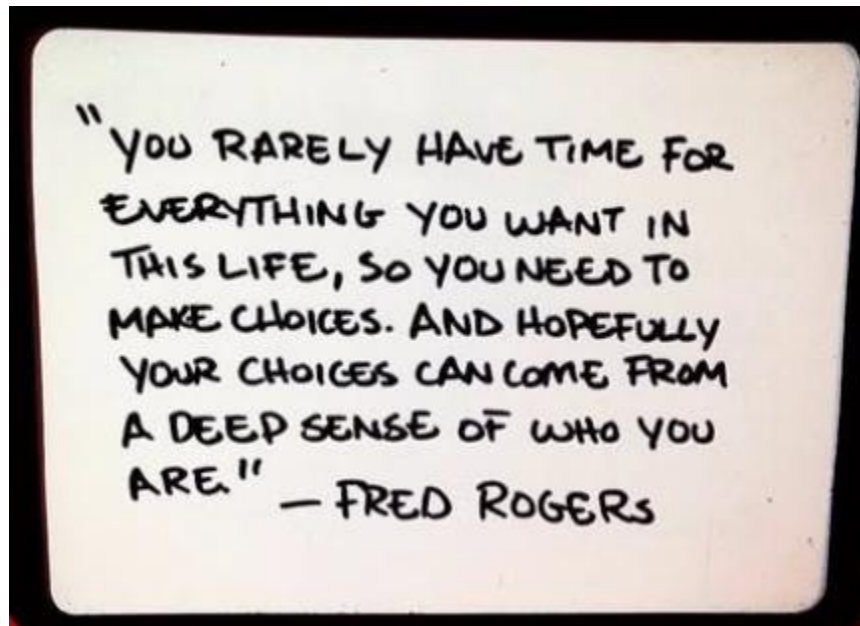
I'm reading Daniel Boorstin's 1998 book, *The Seekers: The Story of Man's Continuing Quest to Understand His World*. I was struck by a section of the book about Socrates. It showed quite clearly that he too was guided by something very much like the Inner Teacher.

But there were legends of his [Socrates'] occasionally sensing a divine sign... There is ample evidence that he was not governed only by [logic]. When it might have incriminated him, in his final speech to the court [during the trial in which he was ultimately convicted and sentenced to death], Socrates recalled his periodic mystic experience.

"I experience a certain divine or daemonic something... It began in childhood and has been with me ever since, a kind of voice, which whenever I hear it always turns me back from something I was going to do, but never urges me to act."

Socrates himself seems to have put great store by this divine inner voice. For... after his condemnation and his refusal to request a change in the penalty or be smuggled out of the country, he reassures his friends.

"Hitherto, the divine faculty of which the internal oracle is the source has constantly been in the habit of opposing me even about trifles... But the oracle made no sign of opposition [to me accepting the death sentence], either when I was leaving my house in the morning, or when I was on my way to the court, or while I was speaking, at anything I was going to say. ... It is an intimation that what has happened to me is a good, and that those who think that death is an evil are in error."



Stop, Drop, and Roll: A Practice for Living Nonviolently

(1-hour experiential workshop)

December 21, 2025 after meeting program: This workshop will offer practices for practicing nonviolence, moment by moment, in our bodies, our words, and our choices.

"Stop, Drop, and Roll" offers a practice for moments of inner or outer "fire": reactivity, fear, anger, urgency, or conflict. The practice will be introduced and experienced through brief experiences, silence, and simple embodied exercises. We will explore how to pause habitual reactions, return to presence, and respond from a place aligned with care, truth, and nonviolence.

We'll engage in daily practices to deepen body awareness, daily Bible readings, and shared inquiry into what this experience teaches us about worship and everyday life.

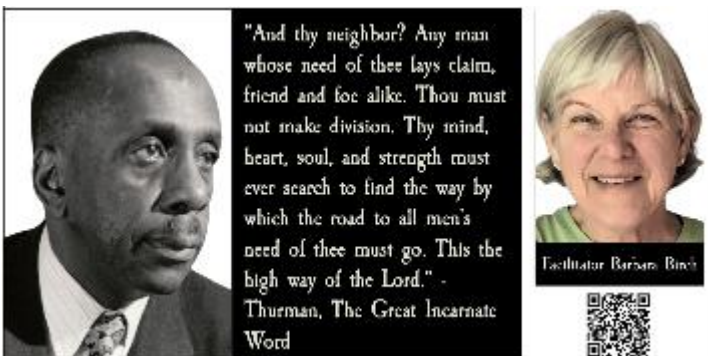

Friends General Conference (FGC), a North American association of Quaker meetings, has adopted a new governance structure. The change aims to better serve meetings, enhance diversity, expand volunteer opportunities, and align decision-making with FGC's mission and values.

The decision came during FGC's Central Committee Annual Sessions after several years of discernment. Sessions were held October 23–26 at the Mother Boniface Spirituality Center in northeast Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

The new structure includes a governing board, representatives council and revitalized volunteer committees.

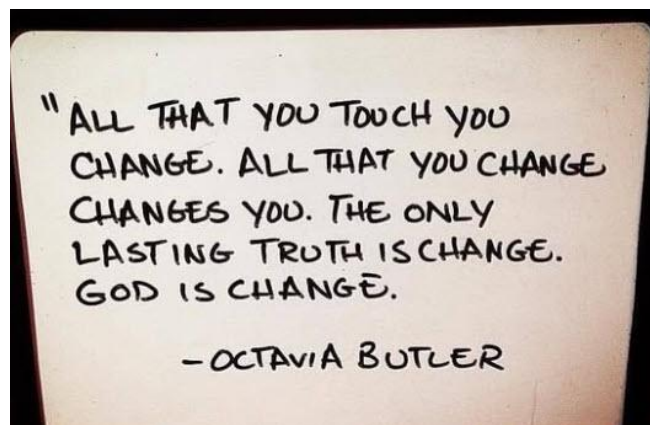

Just a quick note to invite you again to take 30 minutes and listen in to my conversation on “[The Nonviolent Jesus Podcast](#),” with my friend of 35 years, legendary folk singer, Joan Baez. She’s a lifelong activist for peace, justice, civil and human rights. So I asked her all my questions about nonviolence, including questions about Dr. King, Merton, Dorothy Day, Vaclav Havel, and the mysterious connection between music and peacemaking. Check it out!

As a fan of Joan Baez since the age of five, I was thrilled when we she read to me her new poem “This Is Not Optimism,” and when we concluded by reading together her brilliant 1960s essay, “What Would You Do If,” a dialogue about the threat of personal assault.

At the very end, when I ask her for any parting thoughts for our listeners, she breaks into song, singing the Civil Rights anthem, “Ain’t Gonna Let Nobody Turn Me Around,” guaranteed to give you chills! At 84, Joan Baez is still carrying her “shining light out into the shit storm,” as she puts it, and I feel blessed and grateful to know her even better from this podcast. Please share this with all your folk music loving, peace activist, and nonviolent Jesus following friends and colleagues, so that it goes viral and inspires many, and together, let’s take heart once more!

PAFM -El Salvador Report

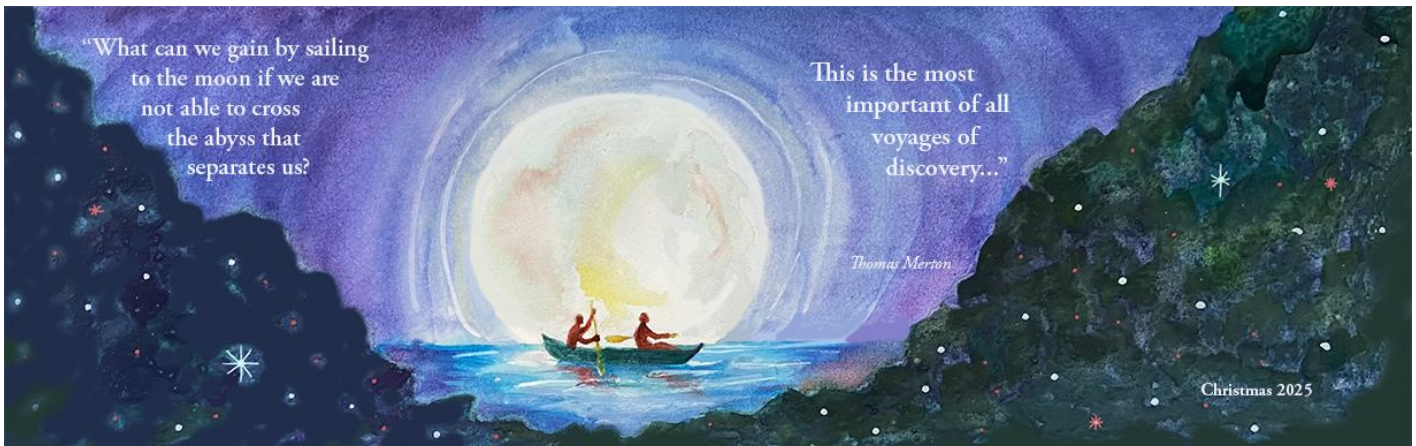
